GRAZING LATEST NEWS!

At its last meeting the Parish Council confirmed its commitment to return grazing to the Common as the best means to restore and enhance the biodiversity of its important grassland habitats, as it is required to do under the NERC Act 2006.

Since the Commons Act 2006 came properly into force, it has been possible for the Council to make considerable changes to its original proposals. Under previous legislation, permanent fencing was the only feasible option. Now, under the 2006 Act, the Council is permitted to use temporary fencing for conservation grazing purposes. So we are now able to respond to the concerns expressed by local residents, so there will be no permanent fencing or cattle grids and it will be possible to keep the cattle away from the horse track.

Prior to any permanent undertaking, the Council propose to graze a small number of cattle on a limited area of the Common in the early Spring of 2009 for a period of about six weeks, depending on the condition of the grass. The cattle will be in enclosures of temporary fencing with access gates and will be placed in a secure paddock at



night. Water will be provided in both the grazing area and the paddock. Walkers will be free to enter the grazing area if they wish but dog walkers entering the area will be required to keep their animals on a lead. The Rangers, in particular Chris Watts who is a qualified herdsman, and the Grazier who will supply the cattle, will be responsible for their well-being. We hope this will enable our parishioners to see first hand what grazing will involve and to experience what it would be like to have cattle back on the Common.

Prior to the beginning of the trial, the public will be fully informed of everything that will be happening by means of notices on the Common, information leaflets and an exhibition in Chorleywood Library. There will also be regular up-dates on the Parish Council's website: www.chorleywood-pc.gov.uk.

After the trial is completed, a full consultation by means of a questionnaire sent to every house in the Parish, will be carried out to assess your views on the success of the trial and on continuing grazing on the Common.



VILLAGE DAY 2008

Our annual Village Day was held on the Common on July 12th and was notable, in such a soggy summer, by managing to stay dry until the end of the afternoon and even producing a short period of sunshine. Well over 1500 attended and enjoyed the events and attractions. The number of stalls was considerably increased this year and the home made produce on sale proved very popular. As always the dog show was a major attraction, this year's winner of best in show being Chip owned and cared for by Emma Butler, closely followed by the ferret racing. Our thanks to all those who contributed to making it such a successful day.



Three Historic Halls

Residents of Chorleywood are fortunate to have access to three village halls. All are managed by Chorleywood Parish Council and each had an interesting beginning.

Chorleywood War Memorial Hall was built in 1920 with money raised by public subscription to commemorate the men of the Parish who lost their lives in the First World War. Further money was raised to add the stage and dressing rooms in 1969 and the hall has now been in constant use by the community for nearly ninety years.

Hollybush Hall, immediately behind the Memorial Hall, was originally built as the club house for the Artisans Golf Club. When, in the 1980s, this club merged with Chorleywood Golf Club and a new combined club house was built, the Hollybush Hall passed to the Parish Council.

Lastly but importantly, due to its location in Heronsgate, there is the **Bullsland Hall**. Lady Lorna Lewis, Chairman of Chorleywood Urban District Council, organised the building of this hall in the 1950s for the benefit of local residents.

The WRVS meals on wheels service has operated from this location ever since. When in 2006 there was doubt about the halls future, following a complete refurbishment, the Parish Council was allowed to take over the running of the hall and the WRVS continues to use its kitchen to provide meals for local elderly people. New Friends

A new "Friends of Carpenters Wood" group has recently been started to help maintain and improve one of the most important woodland sites in Chorleywood. This ancient woodland (which includes Carpenters Wood, Whitelands Wood and Hillas Wood) is not only a wonderful local resource; it is also a Wildlife Site and lies within the Chiltern Hill Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

The "Friends" meet twice monthly, on Thursday and Saturday mornings, and engage in a range of tasks from clearing paths, removing dense holly, thinning and clearing areas of trees, etc. The group is guided and supported by Three Rivers District Council Woodland Officers and by Countryside Management Services staff. No special skills are needed, just enthusiasm and an interest in preserving our woodlands for future generations.

IS YOUR HEDGE PEDESTRIAN FRIENDLY?

A number of residents have complained recently about hedges and shrubs which overhang pavements. Several examples have come to our attention, where pedestrians are forced into the road to bypass overhanging foliage, thereby putting themselves in danger.

However, many people may be unaware that their hedge or shrub border is causing an obstruction to others, or that overhanging hedges are the responsibility of the homeowner. Should you encounter difficulties with overgrown hedges when walking along our pavements, then contact Herts Highways either by ringing 01923 257000, filling in the contact form at www.hertscc.gov.uk or emailing hertsdirect@hertscc.gov.uk. They have a duty to write to the owners of the offending hedge to request that it is cut back. The simplest solution, however, is for everyone to CHECK THEIR HEDGE and make sure it is "pedestrian friendly".
