CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

CLLR RAJ KHIROYA



Firstly I would like to thank our Parish Councillors for electing me and giving the honour of representing you as Chairman of the Parish Council for the year 2013/14. It was discovered that it was 100 years since the start of the Urban District Council (our predecessors) which was formed in April 1913, and therefore in this very special year I found my role as Chairman very interesting and rewarding.

Following the disappointment of the cancellation of Village Day the previous year 2012, due to the very wet weather, our Village Day returned to be bigger and better, the sun shone and a great day was had by all.

Our other annual event was our Charity Quiz Night; we are indebted to Bob and Diana Whitney who run this event for us, raising over £8,500 for local charities by way of a charity auction and quiz.

We held a series of events in the War Memorial Hall to raise the profile of the hall, two indoor fairs and our main event Chorleywood Presents..... which told the history of the hall and showcased what goes on in your village hall. The event was extremely successful with nearly 200 people attending.

Following on with our Four Year Vision, the Parish Council took the decision to commemorate the start of the First World War with the much needed refurbishment of our War Memorial Hall. Designs have been approved and we are now going through planning and tender process. It is likely that the work will take place during the summer months.

We are working with Community Groups to create a Community Plan which will ask all residents of their aims and aspirations for the area in which they live. The demographics of Chorleywood are changing, and as a Parish Council we want to be able to offer the services that the Community want. It is likely that questionnaires will be hitting our doorsteps later in the year.

On a more controversial note, the Parish Council have introduced a parking scheme at the War Memorial and Shepherds Bridge permissive parking areas. We do not wish to penalise local people, or anyone wishing to enjoy the Common but we are aware that over 40% of the parking areas were being used by commuters travelling by train into London and this is not what this space is for. The parking remains free but time limits apply. More information can be found on the Parish website.

We said goodbye to two PCSO's firstly James Stopford who has now passed his Police Constable exams and works in the Watford Area, and secondly to Tania Stabler who many of you will have known, she worked tirelessly with local youths and residents ensuring to keep the very low crime rates in the area. She has now moved on to pastures new and we wish them both well. We have also welcomed PCSO Cloe Hatch who joined the Parish team earlier in the year, and are waiting for the second replacement.

As Chairman I attended a number of functions on behalf of the Council

- The Parish Council Village Day held in July 2013 where over 3,000 people attended.
- The Royal British Legion Service of Remembrance at Christ Church reading the lesson.

- The Parish Council charity Quiz Night which raised over £8500 with each charity receiving just under £400 each.
- The opening of the new building at Christchurch School which was officially opened by the Archbishop.
- With the Vice Chairman Cllr Mrs Sutherland attended the RVS Lunch club to give out Christmas gifts.
- With the Vice Chairman, Cllr Mrs Sutherland attended the Brownies Sleepover in the War Memorial Hall. I swapped my chain of office for the Brownie Sash and believe that I am now an honorary Brownie. Sweets and biscuits had been supplied by the Parish Council for the Brownie Midnight Feast.
- Attended a Q&A session with the Archbishop at Christ Church, which was filmed and would be shown on TV.

I will finish my term of office slightly later this year, having been deeply honoured to announce that I have been invited to the Buckingham Place Garden Party on 3rd June 2014 to represent the work of Parish Councils, something I am very much looking forward to.

I would like to close this report by thanking Cllr Lyn Sutherland as my Vice Chairman and my fellow Parish Councillors for their help and support. We have Parish Council Elections this year and for those who are standing again I wish them luck and for those who are not I wish them well. On a special note I would like to thank Cllr Margaret Jarrett, who after nearly 30 years has decided to 'retire'. Her dedication to this Parish and our Common has been without question.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank the Clerk and all the members of the staff for the hard work, their dedication and the commitment they have shown. Their support is deeply appreciated.



Class of 2013, the Parish Council celebrate its 100 Birthday



This has been a year dominated by five issues: the weather, the play area, the nature trail, grazing and parking.

Our Rangers are responsible for the maintenance of Grovewood, the Allotments, the Lawn Cemetery and of course the Common.

In addition to cutting the grass in the allotments and on the Common the Rangers maintain the Lawn Cemetery, both of which are maintained to a very high standard. Following the storms in late October and early February many trees on the Common and in Grovewood suffered considerable damage and the Rangers estimate that over 100 trees were lost in all.

Church Pond which was drained and had the silt removed last year has recovered faster than expected and the plant life and amphibians are abundant.

We have three allotment sites with a total of 95 full plots and 46 half plots. There are currently 18 people on the waiting list for plots when they become available. Meetings are held on a regular basis with allotment holders to discuss their concerns and matters of mutual interest.

We have stepped up our Common educational programme this year and Ranger Andy Goddard has undertaken numerous outings on the Common with groups from U3A, St Clement Danes School and the Chorleywood Primary Schools. He also incorporated a two hour educational session into the Woodoaks Association fun days which were held during the summer.

Rogation Sunday was on the 5 May and we had a healthy group turn out to “beat the bounds” an ancient tradition to mark the boundaries of the Common.

Unlike last year when Village Day had to be cancelled due to the waterlogged ground this year’s event went ahead in glorious sunshine and was a great success enjoyed by an estimated 3000 visitors.

We had the honour of hosting the annual Chiltern Conservation Board Common Day in October. The theme of which was Sport and Recreation. As well as the members of its board the event was attended by a number of interested parties including the Golf and Cricket clubs and representatives from Christchurch School and Friends of the Common.

After numerous meetings and many hours of debate it was finally decided at a Full Council Meeting on 1 October that the proposed site for a Play Area on the Common was unacceptable. The police report was highly critical of the proposed site and we considered that the issues of access and parking had not been addressed by TRDC.

In February we held a Common Information Day at the Memorial Hall to inform the public of our plans for the Nature Trail and to update them regarding the grazing. Once the Virtual Fencing is in place we will be grazing, initially, 4 longhorn cattle for a short period in the forthcoming months ably looked after by our Ranger and qualified herdsman Chris Watts. Longhorns have

been chosen because of their docile nature. Virtual Fencing is a system that has been in use in Europe for a number of years and is currently used in Epping Forest and Burnham Beeches. It comprises of an electric cable carrying a low voltage current which is buried in the ground around the perimeter of the area to be grazed. The cattle wear a collar which detects the current and when they approach the wire they hear a warning buzz via the collar, if they continue towards the wire they receive a mild shock. They quickly learn to stay within the enclosed area .Notices will be posted around the perimeter pointing out the grazing area.

Our plans for a Nature Trail across the Common are at an advanced stage as is our application for grant funding to finance the project. Once completed we hope it will encourage more young children to visit and enjoy all that the Common has to offer.

Parking at the Memorial Hall and Shepherds Bridge car parks has always been an issue and is not helped by commuter parking. These permissive parking areas are for the use of people using the Common. Free vend parking meters have now been installed at both sites and will become operational imminently.

Jason Horwood successfully completed his apprenticeship and now has full time employment with Harwood Downs Golf Club.

Earlier this year a memorial bench was placed on the Common overlooking Larks Meadow in memory of the late Councillor Norman Eve who sadly lost his fight against cancer last year. Norman was a dedicated and conscientious councillor serving this community for more than 20 years.

After 30 years of dedicated service, many of them on, and as Chair of the Open Spaces Committee, Councillor Mrs Margaret Jarrett has decided that she will not stand for re-election. Margaret and her experience and knowledge of the Common and the environment will be greatly missed and a sad loss to the Parish. We wish her well in her “retirement”.

Our thanks are once again due to the Friends of Chorleywood Common for all their support and volunteer work, RSPB for their bird report, Bill Cattle for the Butterfly Survey, Emma Bindloss for her work on the Nature Trail Heritage Lottery Fund application and Chorleywood Horticultural Society for judging the Best Allotment competition. I would like to add my personal thanks to all the staff and Committee members for their continued help and support over the last 12 months.





Nationally, the residential property market has continued to contract over the past twelve months, a fact reflected within Chorleywood Parish. New housing developments are scarce and pressure on existing stock has been evident in rising prices. There are very few undeveloped sites within the Parish suitable for new homes: the vast majority of planning applications submitted within Chorleywood being for extensions and improvements to existing properties with a small, but increasing, number for demolition and rebuild projects as residents seek to update older housing stock. The Planning Committee continues to see planning applications to develop the Green Belt, or to use large single-dwelling plots for the construction of several new-builds.

The Parish Planning Committee plays a vital role in supporting Parishioners' views on local planning matters. We have welcomed many residents to our meetings who use their right to address the Committee, and we consider all representations received on planning applications, negative and positive, to assist our deliberations. We have offered residents advice on planning legislation and support on speaking at TRDC's Development Control Committee meetings. A member of the Chorleywood Planning Committee always attends TRDC's meetings where there is a Parish application under consideration. We also consider and make representations on a wide range of projects in neighbouring districts and counties where Chorleywood Parish Council is a statutory consultee.

The Planning Committee meet every three weeks to consider all planning applications within the Parish. During 2013/2014 232 applications came before the Committee (a slight reduction from 253 the year before), of which 167 were passed without objection. The Planning Committee registered concerns for 41 applications and objected to the remaining 24 applications, which we asked to be considered by TRDC Development Control Committee. Three Rivers approved 193 of applications relating to Chorleywood, 10 were refused and 11 were withdrawn (the remaining 19 applications are yet to be determined by TRDC at time of writing). Additionally, 7 applications have been taken to Appeal during the last year. Where possible we have attended these hearings, including an Appeal on a property bounding the Parish but actually within Sarratt Parish. Of the Appeals relating to the Chorleywood, 5 were dismissed and 2 were allowed.

The past year has also seen a continued drive from Central Government to give communities the power to influence their environment through the Localism Act. Chorleywood Parish Council is committed to working with the Community to improve and enhance Chorleywood for all residents through its new Community Plan initiative. The Planning Committee will be liaising closely with this project as it moves forward.



CHORLEYWOOD VILLAGE HALLS MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

CLLR. RODNEY KIPPS



The village halls continue to be used by the community in many ways, dance classes, bowls, keep fit, Tea Dances run by TRDC, NADFAS, U3A, CADS, Chorleywood Book Shop Events, the Chorleywood Horticultural Show three times per year and the Residents Association AGM each year with parties and weddings most Saturdays.

As we celebrated the War Memorial halls 90th Birthday last year, the Committee decided to carry on the momentum with Saturday Indoor Markets, fairs and an event in February called Chorleywood Presents..... This showcased all the activities going on in the village Hall. This was set alongside a dialogue read from the original minutes of the War Memorial Hall committee on how the hall was originally thought of. This was narrated by Martin Clarkson and was enjoyed by an audience of nearly 200 people.

The Hollybush Hall is used for smaller meetings and parties, in the future there are plans to use it as an educational centre for schools to learn about the common and the local environment.

Bullsland Hall continues to be the home of the RVS meals on wheels and weekly lunch club, children's parties and baby groups.

The council is in the process of a long overdue refurbishment of the War Memorial hall which will include updating of the toilets, creation of a new meeting room and WIFI. These works are likely to be undertaken this summer.

We hope that the community will continue to use and support the events held in the halls. I would like to thank all the members of the Management Committee for their support this year. Also the staff at the Parish Office who does all the day to day administration, the caretakers and cleaners, without them the halls could not run.





The Environmental Forum is made up of representatives of Three Rivers District Council, the five Parish Councils, wildlife and environmental organisations such as The Herts Biological Records Centre, the Countryside Management Services, the Herts and Middlesex Wildlife Trust and representatives of national and local environmental groups and residents' organisations.

Its aim is to raise awareness of the problems facing the environment and to work towards the delivery of National and County Biodiversity Action Plans. Its meetings also provide a forum for the exchange of information between a wide variety of organisations concerned with the improvement and protection of the environment and it is represented on the Herts Environmental Forum. It is also responsible for the running of the Rickmansworth Canal Festival and Environmental Fair. Members report on problems and on the progress of local initiatives in their area and update the Forum on the work of their organisations, thereby making members of the District Council aware of the immense amount of work being put in by the Parishes and volunteer groups to protect the environment within Three Rivers.

Over the past year the Forum has received regular reports from the TRDC Environmental Officer on biodiversity initiatives in Three Rivers and the work of the Herts Environmental Forum. We have also received presentations on the Forestry Ecosystems and the Croxley Rail Link.

THE CHILTERN'S CONSERVATION BOARD CLLR. MARGARET JARRETT



The Chilterns Conservation Board is a Government body responsible for conserving and enhancing the Chiltern Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty as part of our national landscape heritage. It is made up of representatives from all the county, district and parish councils in the AONB and a number of members appointed by the Secretary of State. I represent the Hertfordshire parishes in the AONB on the Board.

The Board and its staff are involved in almost everything that goes on in the Chilterns, including planning and design, access, chalk streams, chalk downland, farming and land use, woodland management, school activities, common land, local produce and tourism. I attend several Board Meetings per year and am a member of the Board's Planning Committee and the Commons Network Steering Group. Like many other organisations, the Board is being hit by cuts to its budget, but the director, staff and Board have so far managed to maintain their standard of care for the AONB. It has an excellent website, www.chilternsaonb.org, where you can find out more.

For our Parish Council, the Chilterns Commons Network and the new Chilterns Commons Project are the main point of contact. The Network has a major grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund to support a dedicated officer to work with commons in the Chilterns. The Project Officer, Rachel Sanderson, has been working with commons' owners, managers and volunteer groups to try to re-connect local people to their

commons by enabling people to get involved in caring for and studying their commons. She hopes to improve the conservation of our common land in the Chilterns both by practical work and by increasing people's understanding of commons through a broad range of activities.

Since the project was launched, a great many training workshops have been held on a huge variety of subjects concerning the history, law and management of Common Land. Nearly all of these have been heavily over-subscribed. Some of our councillors, rangers and the Clerk have attended many of these workshops and we have learned a lot. The Network has seen a great increase in volunteer work on Chilterns commons as a result of these workshops. The 2013 programme included courses on species surveys, habitat management, organising family activities and another history workshop, by popular demand. The Project held a huge Commons History and Fun Day at COAM in June and Chorleywood Parish Council hosted a very successful Chilterns Commons Day this year, which was attended by commons groups from all over the AONB.

New commons groups have joined the Chilterns Commons Network, which aims to act as a point of contact for people working to conserve and restore their commons, providing advice, support and information. It has also been able to provide funding for various commons' projects. This Council has received grants towards the clearing of the Church pond and towards proposed interpretation boards for the Common.

This is my last year on the Conservation Board and it has been a wonderful experience to work with both the Board members and the staff team who are so deeply committed to and enthusiastic about their work. They don't just talk. They get things done! It has been active, productive, interesting and exciting work and I am very glad to have been a part of it.

LOCAL STRATEGIC PARTNERSHIP BOARD CLLR. JACKIE WORRALL



The Local Strategic Partnership continues to be important but only meets when there is something important to discuss. A new member has been elected from Watford Rural Parish Council to represent the Parishes within the Three Rivers District as Jackie Worrall's two year term has now come to an end.

THE PARISH REPRESENTATIVE ON HIGHWAYS 2013/2014

CLLR. JANE WHITE



Chorleywood Parish Council is committed to representing the views and needs of its Parishioners and takes a keen interest in the maintenance and function of the Parish highways, which fall under the jurisdiction of Herts County Council.

A matter of particular significance in this past 12 month period has been flooding, experienced particularly in Green Street and resulting in prolonged periods of road closure and attendant effects on the local bus routes; and on the pavement stretch between the Common and St Clement Dane's School, forcing schoolchildren to step into Chorleywood Road.

Herts County Council holds a number of "Highways Liaison" meetings throughout the year, all of which have been attended by a representative of Chorleywood Parish Council. We are gratified that, as a result of our representations, a land drain has been installed in the pavement stretch by St Clement Dane's, which, hopefully, will avoid a repeat of this winter's flooding, and, at the time of writing, a formal investigation into the Green Street flooding is underway, with a report on remedial actions expected in the near future..

We have also consulted on traffic calming measures, parking restrictions and reported to Herts CC on the appearance of potholes over the winter months.

CHORLEYWOOD YOUTH CLUB

The Committee are currently working with TRDC on the three year draft lease for the Youth Club premises and are seeking legal advice in order that a formal lease can be accepted. Subsequently two further leases need to be drawn up in favour of our existing sub tenants. The Chorleywood Youth Club continues to thrive. The Management Committee are working with YMCA and meetings are held weekly at their base on the Chorleywood House Estate every Friday evening 7.30 – 9.30 pm. The Club is open to 12 to 18 year olds.

CHORLEYWOOD TWINNING ASSOCIATION

The year 2013/14 has been relatively quiet as the Association ended the previous year with a visit from the Twinning Association of Dardilly, the town with which we are twinned (April 2013). A lot of planning and fund raising events have occupied the Association's Committee and Members this year.

Activities for 2013/14:

- July – Chorleywood Village Day. A successful day for the Association with great interest received at the stall, raising the Association's profile and seeing an increase in membership.
- January – Le Vendee Militaire Talk by Chris Kemp. A superb evening where we were treated to an insightful talk on the destruction caused by the French Revolution in the Vendee region.
- March – Quiz Evening. Featuring good food, challenging questions and a lively atmosphere.
- The French Conversation Group. A group of 17 meet every two weeks during term time to improve their conversational French. There are now two groups: one meets on Monday evenings and the other on Wednesday afternoons.

The next twinning visit is from 24th – 29th October 2014 when we will be visiting Dardilly.

CHORLEYWOOD YOUTH COUNCIL

CHILTERN OPEN AIR MUSEUM

In November 2013 the Museum received The Beautiful South Gold Award 2013-2014 for the Small Attraction of the year. All Gold winners can apply for Visit England Small Attraction of the Year Award. After a visit from an inspector they are on the short list for this honour. Another accolade was given from the Buck's Examiner; Pride of Bucks Environment Award.

An annual pass can now be purchased for £25.00 (Adult). There are child rates and family passes available too.

As the Museum is open throughout the year now, there are more events planned. Starting in March with the Chiltern Warrior Obstacle Race, Enchanted Museum, (at night) May, Art's Festival in June, Classic Car Show – third weekend in July, Jazz Festival and Picnic – 6th August, Harvest Festival, Halloween and a Christmas Event. All programme events can be found on the Museum website.

Fundraising: To keep the Museum financially viable (it costs £1,000 per day to run), Government grants are continuously sought for ongoing maintenance. There are 14 buildings in storage waiting to be erected on the site. The Museum has 4 full time staff and several part timers, which add to the running costs. To help with fund raising more work with school groups, primarily key stages 1 2 and 3, are encouraged to visit the Museum as part of the educational programme. There are school workshops in the Iron Age House, cooking demonstrations and building work, i.e. repairing wattle and daub walls. Archaeological digs are made by the children beside the Iron Age House. Objects of various historical ages are buried in the ground by the Museum staff and the children have to dig them out and analyse their finds.

Themed birthday parties are on the increase, where children can dress up in costume from different periods of history.

Wedding reception hire is already available and now the Museum has applied for a license to hold weddings in the large barn. So the full wedding package will now be on offer.

The Museum continues to be hired out for filming, "Endeavour" and "Chickens" were two programmes mentioned who used the Museum in their episodes.

The Museum also have a large number of volunteers without whom they would not be able to operate, they are always very grateful to anyone willing to volunteer for their many tasks.

Police Annual Report 2013-14

Crime for the year dated 01/04/2013 to 31/03/2014 is down compared to the previous year over both areas.

Overall crime has decreased by 16% and ASB has decreased by 38%

- Speeding has been an issue outside St Clement Danes School in May I am planning to use the SID (Speed indication devise) to make people aware of their speeds.
- Residents of Solesbridge Lane have joined a drive safe campaign; they have been given full training for using SID and also have access to PNC to do checks and send letters to speeding motorists.
- As of 23rd May 2014 Chorleywood will be a part of the Rickmansworth SNT. This means that the Neighbourhood Officers who will be patrolling Chorleywood will now be coming from Rickmansworth Police Station.
- The monthly Beat Surgeries are still being conducted in the local area but to try and help increase numbers attending we have held them at a number of locations at different days/times. I will continue to do this throughout the summer.
- In March Tania left the constabulary to pursue other interests, we are still waiting for a replacement but hopefully it won't be too long.
- Although there are still quite a few burglaries in the area the burglary rate has decreased by 41%. By sending out regular OWL messages on home security I am hoping to reduce this even more.
